

### Ten New Species Added to the PAWALGARH CHECKLIST!

The 2nd Uttarakhand Spring Bird Festival was successfully conducted by the Uttarakhand Forest Department at Pawalgarh Conservation Reserve from 4th to 8th February 2015.

Birdwatching at Pawalgarh, Sitabani and Kyari was the highlight of the Bird Festival. Seasoned birders and beginners, school children, members of the local community, forest staff from across Uttarakhand and many others showed great enthusiasm on the birding trails and everyone wholeheartedly agreed that the birdwatching was rewarding. Birdwatching was conducted at eight different forest trails, and over the four days, 800 people went birdwatching not only from Uttarakhand, but also Punjab, West Bengal, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Nagaland, Karnataka, Delhi, Meghalaya, Uttar Pradesh, Haryana and a few foreigners. The birdwatching was conducted by seasoned guides from various parts of Garhwal and Kumaon including those from rural communities. The Checklist of Birds of



species were observed taking the list of birds at Pawalgarh Conservation Reserve


Mansingh and her troupe "Akashgaami" mesmerized the audience and reminded about morals that are both timeless and universal in appeal. The performance was very well received by visitors to the Bird Festival as well as by forest staff and villagers. It helped in attracting rural folk to the Bird Festival and greatly helped in raising the profile of the event. A rural tourism and craft mela was conducted at Chunakhan over all the four days. Numerous other workshops such as photography, bird identification and conservation, bird in arts enthralled visitors to the Festival.

The Bird Festival was sponsored by MoEFCC, CAMPA, UFDC, UTDB, NABARD, and UGVS. Fourteen organizations supported the event – Titli Trust, Corbett Gram Vikas Samiti, Rainbow Friends of Nature & Environment, WWF, NSI, Himal Prakriti, Gangotri, ONGC, GBPIHED, Welham Boy's School, Kalpavriksh and Waste Warriors.

The next Uttarakhand Spring Bird Festival will be organized at Asan Conservation Reserve from 11th to 14th February 2016. This will help to achieve the aim of making Uttarakhand a major birding destination, and through this, enhancing both bird conservation and local community livelihoods.

### The TIGER Tell His TALES

Just imagine, a family of tigers, with grandparents and grandchildren, somewhere in the jungle near Kaladungi, settling down for the night after a good meal, and the oldest male growling to get everyone's attention, and then telling tales he had heard as a cub of a man called Corbett who walked the jungles like a tiger, growled like a tiger, loved the land like a tiger, was as fearless as a tiger, as noble, as wise - and - wonder of wonders - he stopped hunting us just for sport, just for the thrill, and even set up a vast park – just for us – where we still live in peace and comfort.

And – this the senior growls with deep emotion – his grandfather had actually seen Corbett, had seen his footprints, had sensed his presence. The young cubs drift off to sleep, but they nod their heads in mutual wonder - wonder at how a man could actually be love them, think like them, respect them, and give up hunting of them - a man!

As I read stories of Corbett to schoolchildren near Pawalgarh and Kaladungi, these were the thoughts that swirled in my heart and mind – as we read together of the Boar River, with it flowing so close by – as we read together of the Kaladungi jungle, while actually deep within it – as we felt Corbett's passion in the easy flow of his words, it was as if nothing has changed, as if Corbett would still arise in his Kaladungi bungalow, wish Maggie good-

And then when we walked together past the old hunting lodge, past the still praying mandir, down towards the glade, forded the Boar river, and eased



morning, have a cup of tea, and head off with Robin into his beloved jungle.

ourselves through the one-mile jungle, Corbett was showing us the way - guiding us, teaching us, sharing with us – and when we came upon a group of artisans on the banks of the Boar, carving gourds out of wood with the most rudimentary of equipment, using the power of the river to run their tools, Corbett leaned against a tree on the higher bank, smoked his bidi, sipped his tea, nodded in approval, and then melted away into the evening, into time

Corbett writes with such humour and human understanding about ghosts, and churails, and girls' skirts rising in the water around them as they dip to bath, to the calls of birds and animals, to the shades of the leaves of his favourite trees, to the frailty of both nature and man, to the need to preserve what is beautiful and truth in both animals and humans – he is not a single-minded shikari, hunting to fulfill his ego and his pride – he was – and is – a naturalist who loved his 'school', his jungle, as he loved the man within himself.

Thanks to the vision of Rajiv Bhartari – and others – I have been sharing the Corbett stories with the people of

Kaladungi, Ramnagar, Dhikala, Delhi, Dehra Dun, Mussoorie – for the past almost ten years – tourists, schoolchildren, forest guards, forest administrators - even the distant tiger, listening in - it has been an honour, and this year at Pawalgarh was especially wonderful, because in just three days we could touch so many people, from Ministers to the mundane – could share Corbett with his very people.

May I continue to be blessed – and may the tales of Corbett always ring out through the evening like temple bells, like the cries of the jungle – like our very own voices.


Rainbow Friends of Nature training PPP vouth

My first visit to Pawalgarh Conservation Reserve (PCR) in 2014 left me enthralled. Here I was in the very landscape that Jim Corbett walked, on foot! Unlike Corbett Tiger Reserve, where most areas are visited in a vehicle or elephant back, the attraction of Pawalgarh was that I could walk in this marvelous, bio-diverse landscape. At the same time, I observed that there were no guides, no regulations, and pretty much tourists did as they pleased in the Conservation Reserve. In addition, the sight of tourists sitting glumly in jeeps meant that their experience at Pawalgarh, too, left a lot to be desired. Despite the success of the 2 nd Uttarakhand Spring Bird Festival in February 2015, the niggling thought remained; could not we make Pawalgarh a model destination for the forest department, tourists and the local community, a win-win for all stakeholders?

Thus was born the Pawalgarh Ecotourism Development Project. With ONGC CSR agreeing to fund this and with Bachi Singh Bisht and Rajesh Bhat of Rainbow Friends of Nature and Environment coming on board as partners, we were all set to begin work in March 2015 with support and encouragement from the Ramnagar Forest Divisions and the Ecotourism Wing of the Uttarakhand Forest Department.

Six months down the line, I am astounded by the progress made! Pawalgarh Prakriti Prahari (PPP), the youth group formed at PCR is up and running, in fact soaring. The excitement is palpable; now sixty members strong, the youth actively participate in the nature guide-training program. The speed at which milestones are being achieved (see box on next page) and new goals are being set are leaving us breathless!

#### **KEY MILESTONES**

- Apr 2015: Starter nature guide training course at Chunakhan
- May 2015: Pawalgarh Prakrati Prahari is born
- June 2015: First butterfly survey at Pawalgarh
- July 2015 onwards: Rainbow Friends of Nature begin fortnightly field training sessions for PPP nature guides
- July 2015: PPP logo gets finalized; conceptualized by Manohar Singh Manral
- August 2015: Clean Parthenium Day. Clean Corbett Day. PPP does its bit for conservation.

- August 2015: PPP membership grows to 60 people! Members join from many villages-Pawalgarh, Mankanthpur, Chhoi, Gaibua, Kotabagh and Kyari.
- **September 2015:** Target date for launch of nature guides for Pawalgarh set with DFO, Ramnagar as December 2015.
- September 2015: Refresher nature guides training course conducted by Rainbow Friends of Nature.
- October 2015: Theory & practical tests conducted to select nature guides for PCR.
- **November 2015:** Pawalgarh butterfly brochure and bulletin ready.

Registered guides will be appointed soon. These guides will ensure a quality experience for tourists. Discussions are on for developing rural homestays, promoting local cuisine in a shop in PCR, registering PPP as a society and conservation programs by the Forest Department receives loads of support from PPP. Hope soars; PPP itself is readying to take to wing. A great experience for tourists; ethical guiding; rural homestays; local cuisine; support for conservation action...will all this and more happen? Time will tell, but the first baby steps of PPP are a beacon of hope.



# पवलगढ़ प्रकृति प्रहरी

पवलगढ़ कन्जरवेशन रिजर्व के आस-पास के ग्रामीणों को राज्य गठन के पहले से ही ये आशा रही कि उत्तराखण्ड राज्य निर्माण के पश्चात वनों के अस्तित्व से वे लाभान्वित होंगे, और वनों के संरक्षण के लिए वे हमेशा गंभीर रहे, इसी कारण से स्थानीय लोगों ने ईको-पर्यटन को अपनी आजीविका के रूप में अपनाने का प्रयास किया, अधिकांश लोगों को मन है कि पर्यावरण से छेड़छाड़ के बगैर स्थानीय लोगों की आर्थिक स्थिति सुंदृढ़ करने हेतु यदि ईको-पर्यटन को अपनाया जायं तो वन-संरक्षण के प्रति लोगों की सोच और भी प्रबल होगी, एक अन्तराल के उपरान्त इस सोच को और बल मिला जब ४ से ८ फरवरी २०१५ तक पवलगढ़ में ''स्प्रिंग बर्ड फेस्टिवल'' का आयोजन किया गया, इससे देश-विदेश में पवलगढ़ को नई पहचान मिली। यह आयोजन श्री राजीव भर्तरी: निदेशक

ईको-ट्रिज्म, सुश्री कहकशां नसीम; डी.एफ.ओ. रामनगर वन प्रभाग, श्री संजय सोंढ़ी व श्रीमति अंचल सोंढी, तितली ट्रस्ट के संयुक्त प्रयास से स्थानीय लोगो के सपनों को कार्यान्वित करने की दिशा में एक ठोस पहल था।

दि. २६.०५.२०१५ को ''पवलगढ़ प्रकृति प्रहरी'' नामक संस्था का गठन किया गया और सभी के विचारों की सहमित से इसके नियम बनाये गये। श्री मनोहर सिंह मनराल-पर्यारवरण हितैषी ने इसका प्रतीक चिन्ह डिजायन किया जिसे ''तितली ट्रस्ट'' द्वारा अंतिम रुन दिया गया, प्रत्येक १५ दिनों में ''प्रकृति प्रहरी'' विभिन्न स्थानों पर पर्यावरण से संबन्धित कार्यशालाओं का आयोजन करते हैं, जिन्हें रेन्बों क्लब के जाने माने नेचुरेलिस्ट श्री बची सिंह बिस्ट व श्री राजेश भड़ के मार्गदर्शन में सम्पन्न किया

## PAWALGARH'S Dazzling Butterflies

Standing at the Pawalgarh Forest Rest House, I gawked at the activity around me. The Forest Rest House's compound buzzed with butterflies in flight. I did not know where to look, so great was the butterfly diversity and numbers. This experience, repeated itself over the next three days! It was the hot month of May and I was at the Pawalgarh Conservation Reserve for a survey of its butterfly and moth fauna, the first in what I hope will be a multiyear, multi season study. Just the first survey, during which we recorded close to a hundred butterfly species, and twice as many moth species, convinced me about Pawalgarh's terrific lepidopteran diversity.

- Here are some of the butterfly "specials" at Pawalgarh....
- Spot Swordtail Graphium nomius... Most commonly seen on the wing in April and May. On hot summer days, many individuals can be seen mud-puddling together at moist spots.
- Copper Flash Rapala pheritima...Seen occasionally at Pawalgarh. First reported from Uttarakhand by Smetacek (1995) from Bhimtal and Kaladhungi in Nainital District extending its range westwards to Kumaon.
- Redspot Zesius chrysomallus... Can be spotted near its larval food plant (Guava). First reported from Uttarakhand by Singh (2005) from Dehradun. No published record from Kumaon but I saw it at the Khichdi River banks in Pawalgarh in June 2015.
- Spangled Plushblue Flos asoka... This pretty butterfly was first reported from Uttarakhand by Singh (2003), though Smetacek (2001) first reported in from Kumaon in 2011. Seen occasionally at Pawalgarh.
- One-Spot Grass Yellow Eurema andersoni... This species can be seen mud-puddling at the river banks in company of other grass yellows. Though seen occasionally in Garhwal and Kumaon, there have been no published records of this butterfly from Uttarakhand in more than a hundred years!
- Giant Redeye Gangara thyrsis...The Giant Redeye has been reported from Nepal in the east and from Kangra in Himachal Pradesh in the west. There were no records of this species from Uttarakhand until I spotted an individual feeding on a Costus flower at Pawalgarh in August 2015. I only had a visual sighting of the butterfly, and could not get photographic evidence.

Is your appetite whetted yet? If not, head for Pawalgarh for a butterflying session, and I can assure you that the butterfly diversity will only pique your interest further!

# What's Cooking with Kumaoni Cuisine?

Kumaon is the eastern region of Uttarakhand. Most of the cities here were settled in the medieval period of Indian history. The silk route connecting India with China and Tibet greatly influenced Kumaoni traditions and cuisine. During the Mughal period, a large influx of warrior clans also migrated to Kumaon from Rajasthan and even Maharashtra, again influencing its cuisine. During British rule, the Kumaon region was developed as summer capital of Northern Provinces resulting in hill stations such as Ranikhet and Nainital. The British and western influence in cuisine specially bakery items is very visible

Kumaoni cuisine is mostly vegetarian. The lush green forests of Kumaon have a great influence on the cuisine as most of the ingredients come directly from the forests or very near to their wild relatives, specially condiments. Vegetables usually

made from farm fresh vegetables and leaves contain much fiber and highly recommended mineral nutrients, larger uptake of the fibers and mineral to control the cholesterol, blood pressure and other related diseases and disorders. Pulses are also highly rich in proteins, which are easily digestible and very tasty. Their additives enhance the taste of the food so much that there is no need of heavy oil and ghee to make the food tasty. Various recipes of pulses like "Bhatt", "Gahat", "Urad", "Kali Masoor" and "Rajma" are prevalent in the main course which are very spicy and taste-bud tickling. Vegetables are made tasty by addition of condiments like "bhangeera" and "ajwain" Rice is usually hard-boiled. The local variant of the Basmati rice is also grown which is very aromatic but its grains are smaller. The decoction of various pulses mixed and the hard-boiled rice makes the famous recipe called "Ras Bhaat" which is highly nutritional and tasty. "Saag" or "Hari sabji" is made from wild Stinging nettle (Bichhoo ghaas), Chauli (Amaranthus), and mustard leaves. Chutneys and pickles have a special place in the cuisine. The famous "Bhangeeray ki chutney" is made from the seeds of cannabis. These are only a few examples of lip-smacking Kumaoni cuisine!

With the advent of packaged and junk foods in modern times, Kumaoni cuisine has slipped into the shadows. At the 2nd Uttarakhand Spring Bird Festival, which was held at Pawalgarh Conservation Reserve in February 2015, an effort was made by the Uttarakhand Forest Department to revive Kumaoni cuisine. Women Self Help Groups from villages around

Pawalgarh Conservation Reserve were asked to prepare and to sell local cuisine at the festival. Women-folk from Pawalgarh, Mankanthpur, Chhoi and Gaibua were very enthusiastic, but needed some hand holding. Support was sought by the Divisional Forest Office of the Ramnagar Forest Division from Rainbow Friends of Nature, a non-profit local NGO, for the motivation, preparation and management of the local Self Help Groups. After several meetings, the menu was decided based on what cuisine would appeal to the tourists.

During the Bird Festival, these humble ladies got a stall provided by the UKFD to sell their recipes of Kumaoni cuisine. The already shy and not-so-confident ladies were made to face the outside world! The double whammy was that they had to compete with the stalls of Kumaon Mandal Vikas Nigam and Institute of Hotel Management who are seasoned players in the field of cuisine and hospitality. Though hesitant to begin with, the women soon confidently took to the floor. The taste, quality, freshness and low calorie Kumaoni food was very popular. Their food items such as *Mandawa ki roti*, *Hari sabzi*, *Papita ki chutney*, *Moong vada* became a hit at the Festival and demand outstripped supply! The women made a profit of Rs. 40,000/- during the festival and were very grateful to the UKFD for providing them with this opportunity. We hope this small step for the women of Pawalgarh Conservation Reserve may become a giant leap in the future, and we get loads of tasty Kumaoni cuisine to eat!

## Walking Down Memory Lane at CHHOTI HALDWANI

The 2nd Uttrakhand Bird Festival at Pawalgarh, was notable for many interesting activities...but my favourite was the series of heritage walks I got to curate for the festival. Almost 700 students and adults participated in groups of 40 to 70 both in the morning and evening. With the book Walking with Corbett' as a resource material for our walks in Chotti Haldwani, we prepared to showcase the village where the legendary conservationist Jim Corbett lived. Assisting us in the festival were some of the first members of the community who had trained as nature guides in 2003, and who still continue to conduct these popular walks, carrying forward the legacy of Jim Corbett.

School children from nearby places like Ramnagar, Dhela and Nainital and others from further away like Dehradun and Gwalior enjoyed the walk down memory lane. No matter how near or far they came from, the experience was the same; one of awe and amazement;

of being able to walk in the forest and be told that this was once a hunting ground for the young Corbett. Corbett, who took his first lessons of shooting here and shot a leopard at the age of 7! It was an experience to walk along the canal which is an engineering marvel; to see the guzzling water in one part and suddenly seeing it disappear at other.





Chotti Haldwani, Jim Corbett's village, was central to all activities. Once dinner was over it was time to walk in the dark on the small village batiya (village track) watching the moon which was in its full glory during those days and waiting to hear animal calls from the surrounding jungles. The children were up early, every morning, enjoying the fresh air and photographing birds.

The after-dinner film on Corbett's legacy was a great audio visual delight, helping to put things in perspective of an era they have not seen. The film has scenes from the films Jim Corbett made in 1935 of the landscape and its wildlife. It also gave them a glimpses of the Corbett National Park, the India's first National Park.

The sumptuous food, the jungle walks, walking along the flowing water of the canal, the quaint village, the chaupal, film and a healthy dose of Jim Corbett was an enriching experience for the students. The book readings in the evening by Tom Alter added a wonderful flavour to the festival, keeping everyone spellbound and wanting more every night.

I enjoyed every bit of it though it was taxing to handle a group of 70 people for every heritage walk. The village guides trained by us from the community were a great help. In spite of having been exposed to 15 years of tourism, the village folk still remain grounded and are truly taking the legacy of Jim Corbett forward.



### Centenary Festival, Kaladhungi

25-27 December 2015

Jim Corbett purchased Chhoti Haldwani village in 1915 and tried to develop a model Kumaoni village. His efforts to develop agriculture are described in his book "My India". The Festival will commemorate 100 years of Chhoti Haldwani's establishment by Jim Corbett and the effort of Corbett Gram Vikas Samiti to conserve this legacy.

**Venue:** The Chhoti Haldwani Centenary Festival will be organized inside the village. Selected activities will be organized in the Jim Corbett Museum and at the Forest Rest House Kaladhungi.

**Programme & Activities:** The Chhoti Haldwani Centenary Festival 2015 will be inaugurated on Friday 25th December and culminate on Sunday 27th December 2015. The Festival will include several activities - guided bird watching, butterfly walks, Jim Corbett heritage walks. In addition, there will be stalls for local cuisine, local produce & handicrafts, book reading, film shows and cultural performances.
